HISTORY OF RECYCLING AT THE LINKS

In 2006 several Links residents toured Mason Dixon Farm. During our 1 1/2 hour visit, Mr. Richard Waybright took us to the freshening barns (where calves are born). We were told that the bedding in these barns was shredded newspaper. Why not straw, we asked? He explained that straw allows bacteria to grow, possibly infecting the cows and calves. There is no bacteria growth with newspaper.

The farm gets its newspaper supply from local non-profit youth organizations. Mr. Waybright supplied the names of some of these organizations. I ended up contacting Boy Scout Troop 78 from Gettysburg and volunteered to collect papers and see to it that Troop 78 picked them up from my house once a month. We have collected between 400 and 700 pounds of paper each month since 2006. The farm paid the scouts \$65 per ton in 2006; they now pay \$95. Estimated totals up to now are : we have recy-

aled 15+ tons of newspaper and the Boy Scouts have made between \$1200 and \$1500.

There are some requests from the farm and scouts regarding recycling. Papers should be placed in paper bags or bundled with twine. Also, please do not include glossy advertisements, as the ink runs when in contact with animal waste.

Recycling newspapers at the Links is a win/win/win for all. We leave less of a carbon footprint on the environment, the farm gets needed paper for their purposes and the scouts get money to help with their programs. Currently about 40% of the Links residents recycle newspapers for the scouts. Let's try to make it 100%. Newspapers can be dropped off at my house (8 Parkland Court) any time during the month. A monthly reminder regarding the date and time of the pick-up is emailed to all residents.

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW COMMITTEE

The Courtyards Architectural Review Committee (ARC) has had a busy 2011. Residents have requested approval of plans ranging from complex home additions to the simple installation of storm doors. As has been typical of applications submitted from the beginning of the HOA, the applications have been approved with few issues.

The ARC is a committee composed of three

residents appointed by the Executive Board to review and evaluate any alteration to, or change appearance of, the exterior of a home in the Courtyards and to make a recommendation to the Executive Board whether to approve the alteration. The members of the ARC are Liz Zaic, Michaela Biba and Gil Clark.

There are several sections of the "Covenants and Restrictions" and "Rules and Regulations"

of the HOA that prescribe what residents can and cannot do to the exterior of their homes which the ARC is bound to follow. However, where restrictions are not evident, the ARC attempts to balance the desires of homeowners to "express" themselves, with the need to preserve the character of our community and maintain property values.

The HOA website (courtyardshoa.org) contains a set of "Guidelines" that define many things that can be done to the exterior of a house (which includes your front and side yards) without the need to submit a formal

application for approval. The ARC simplified these guidelines for homeowners to lessen the paperwork. Prior to submitting an application, please review the Guidelines to see if your activity is covered.

If consulting the Guidelines doesn't help clarify things, then you should submit an application for approval. Please allow ample time for the ARC to review your plans. In many cases there will be a quick turnaround.

MT. JOY TOWNSHIP & THE LINKS

If you are like me, it wasn't until sometime after moving here that you became aware that government in Pennsylvania is different from, well just about anywhere. It wasn't until it came time to vote, that I discovered that we live in someplace called Mount Joy Township. What the Links had to do with the township or even Adams County was not entirely clear. No one has seen a snow plow with Adams County written on the side or a police car from Mount Joy. And since we live in a self contained environment here at the Links, it may not ever become clear how all of these entities fit together and how they play a role in our lives.

The Links at Gettysburg is a Planned Golf Course Community located within the municipality of Mount Joy Township. As such, the Links has a legally defined status and is responsible for certain functions that would normally be taken care of by the Township. In fact, residents of the Links have few reasons to be involved with the township, as we are responsible for our own street repairs and garbage collection. We have our own sewer and water system, and have fire and police provided by independent volunteer fire companies and the State Police.

So what does the Township provide? In Pennsylvania, the lines of responsibility for civic functions are very different than in other states. In Pennsylvania, every citizen lives in a "municipality," which is either a city, a borough or a township. When this system was put in place (the responsible culprit is rumored to be Ben Franklin) the theory was that as many responsibilities of government as possible would be carried out as close to the people as possible. Thus very few things in Pennsylvania happen at the County level. Other than the courts and land registration and assessment, important functions such as road maintenance and land use and planning are taken care of locally. Voting is done in the municipality. If a police force other than the State Police is present it will be provided at the local level.

The most important responsibility of the typical township in this state is road maintenance. However, townships may opt not to accept responsibility for roads in a housing development, turning the burden over to the

development's HOA. Other roads in a township may be state highways. Mason Dixon and Taneytown Roads are state highways. Unless you drive off the main roads you will not drive on a township road between your house and Gettysburg. That the roads we use everyday are state roads is not necessarily a good thing. If Mason Dixon Road was a township road it would be plowed sooner and maintained better. The bridge over Rock Creek would not have been allowed to fall into disrepair.

Almost half the population of Mount Joy Township lives in Lake Heritage or the Links. The township provides no services to residents of these two communities, yet collects taxes from them. Historically, this has meant that township taxes have been low. However, the 5(five) person Board of Supervisors initiated several ambitious programs during the past decade, including one to preserve farmland. These programs put the township substantially in debt, and taxes were raised 1,500% in 2009. Citizen response to this was to vote out those supervisors. Their replacements have lowered taxes and have phased out programs that are not self funding. These efforts continue.

Most township residents, prior to the huge tax increase paid little attention to township affairs. Links residents paid about \$50 a year in taxes. When that number went closer to \$500 people noticed, especially if they lived in a community that receives no services for that money. At a campaign meeting a few years ago someone asked the candidates what the township provided residents of the Links. The answer was simply 'very little.' As one of the supervisors, our neighbor Gil Clark has given much consideration to this, looking at ways that township services can be provided to all residents on a more equal basis. The position of township supervisor will be on the November 8th ballot. Mount Joy is governed by five elected supervisors. Three of these positions are open. Two are six year terms and one is a two year term.
