## **Master Association Notes**

#### **Links Community Update**

With the potential sale of the golf course within the next couple years, the Master Association has begun discussions with the Links regarding issues and potential concerns related to the proposed sale. Some of the issues raised include:

- 1. Contracts: The Links has contracted with the MA to provide lawn irrigation services and to provide curbside trash pickup. The future of these services is the issue.
- 2. Placement of Garbage and Recycling Containers. The dumpsters are currently located next to the maintenance barn. The availability of alternative sites for this function.
- 3. Use of Links Parking Lot. The parking lot is golf course property but is jointly used by residents who come to the pool and tot lot. Use of and maintenance of this facility is the issue.
- 4. Walking trails: Walking trails run through the preserved open space which includes the golf course and the surrounding property. Whether this arrangement continues as is needs to be determined.
- 5. Shared Costs. The MA and the Links share costs for the upkeep and landscaping of Clubhouse Drive, the area around the pool, maintenance of community fire hydrants, etc. Whether these arrangements continue as is needs to be determined.
- 6. Retention Ponds and the 18th Green Retaining Wall in the Courtyards. These facilities are jointly owned by the CY HOA, golf course and some homeowners, and they serve all entities. The responsibility for the integrity and maintenance of these structures is a matter that needs to be resolved.

The MA will keep the community informed as things develop. Russ Arrighi

#### REMINDER ON TRASH & COMMUNITY PENALTIES!



**REPEAT** - Our trash bins are only for normal household waste and not for large items. If the bins are overflowing, meaning the lid cannot close at the time of pickup, and if oversized or hazardous items are found in the bins, we incur an overage charge for each instance. During March someone placed a gas grill in one of the trash bins.

The Master Association is researching a bulk trash pickup day this year where residents can dispose of large trash items. More to follow.

#### Courtyards (CY) HOA

The Courtyards held their annual meeting in October and re-elected Russ Arrighi to be President of the Executive Board. Frank Negro and Dan McCusker also continue to serve on the Executive Board. The Board also held monthly meetings to review HOA activities and resolve any issues residents brought to their attention. Major updates for the Community include:

- Courtyard repairs, upgrades, and improvements. The Board has developed a list of items
  needing attention/repair/replacement now that Covid restrictions have been lifted and labor is
  becoming available. Expect to see multiple improvement-focused projects kick off this spring and
  summer.
- Snow Removal Contract. The Board negotiated a new snow removal contract as part of a larger "Village" effort and the results have received many accolades. The Board put up orange snow stakes to mark roadways and sidewalks to reduce damage to curbs and grass and will collect them during the first week of April.
- Lawn Care and Landscaping. The Board continues to work with the lawncare company to improve service. We expect to see early application of fertilizer and better lawn service this summer.
- Welcoming Committee. The Board would like to thank Sharon Kuntzman who has been our onewoman Welcome Committee for many years. Sharon has stepped down and Tammy Woolgar and Lin Eichhorn volunteered to take on this important "first impression" effort for new residents. Additionally, the Board authorized funds for a small gift to be included with the updated welcome package.
- Storm Sewer Management. The Board continues to address potential rain run-off issues. Our
  Resident-led storm sewer survey and study committee identified several areas that could use
  inspection and the Board hired a profession to provide an assessment. Results should be
  available later in the spring. Once we understand the results and recommendations, the Board
  will work through the next (possible) steps.

#### Garrison Falls (GF) HOA Development Update

We emerged from our winter hibernation to find that all our vacant lots have disappeared. D. R. Horton completed their model home and opened it to the public on February 12. The remaining18 lots are in various stages of construction with several homes near completion. With the heavy equipment work completed on Ryan Court, the developer is expected to install the pavers on the court and thereby complete the streets for Garrison Falls. We look forward to the end of this year when all construction should be about completed.





With the final homes underway, there is progress on related infrastructure items. Topcoat paving will be applied to Savannah Drive as warmer weather arrives. Also, we expect the installation of remaining streetlights. Lastly, we continue with maintenance of pavers on the internal streets.

Our new landscaping contractor, Ecker's Lawn Service from Taneytown, recently began work in the community by edging beds and installing mulch. The beds look great and as the lawns green up, we expect to start mowing services around mid-April.

#### **Mount Joy Township Update**

At the January Organization meeting for the Mount Joy Township Board of Supervisors, Links resident Bernie Mazer was unanimously elected Chairperson by the Board and Terry Scholle Vice Chairman. Bernie and Terry are sharing the duties of managing the township while decisions regarding ordinances, resolutions, and major procurements are made by the Board.

Bernie has created several township task forces staffed by fellow supervisors and resident volunteers. One will examine an update of the Comprehensive Plan. The second task force will focus on the history of the rural community. Pennsylvania was one of the first states to adopt public education and establish schools in the 1830s. One of the earliest schools in Adams County, the Pleasant Grove School, affectionately known as Mud College, is now owned by the township. The Board is working to prepare the building for tours in May. If there are former educators in the Links or you are interested in one room schoolhouses, please let Bernie or the township know, and provided there is sufficient sign-up, one of the township docents can conduct a tour. The township also owns an old cemetery on Cemetery Road. The Board is planning a community day to clean the headstones, tidy the spaces, and commemorate veterans of the American Revolution, War of 1812, and Civil War buried there. The local Grand Army of the Republic chapter provides American flags every year. The Board is also cataloging historic buildings and sites within the township.

Every year, the township's financial statements are audited. This year, the township received a clean opinion, known as an unqualified audit. Mount Joy's financial situation is heathy and, over the years, the township has eliminated a variety of taxes such as the township real estate tax.

There is ongoing litigation regarding the denial by the Board of large scale solar energy systems in the Baltimore Pike Corridor zone. In April, there will be a decision by the Board on whether to approve a subdivision and land development application for solar energy systems in the Agricultural Zone of Mount Joy. There is a public comment hearing at the township building at 902 Hoffman Road at 7 PM on the 13th of April. Incidentally, the law firm representing the solar company in the two zones is also the same one that represents the Links' associations.

One of the Township's roles is to adopt or amend ordinances as part of the Board of Supervisors legislative authority. The decision to enact or amend an ordinance rest with the discretion of the Board as the Township's executive body. The exceptions to the latter comment arise when the State legislature by enacted law has mandated legislative actions. Mount Joy has ordinances like zoning that determine what kind of structure can be built, whether a property can be repurposed and whether or not it can be replaced with sometime new. The Board just passed several ordinances that have additional conditions for siting and location of land uses like solar engineering facilities and warehousing.

Next quarter, township topics will cover the demographics of Mount Joy.

McCusker, and Jerry Wright with more than able pouring assistance from Deb Fugas, Mary Wright, and Georgette & Mark Gut. These wines pair best with beef, lamb, and game.

Most of the tasters enjoyed the presented wines ... evidenced by the fact that all were consumed. Attendees brought many goodies and their own favorite wines to share. The Group consensus was that the event requires repeat performances. Planning is currently underway for our next event in June. #### **Billiards Anyone?**




The Links Billiard League, after missing all or part of the last two seasons, successfully wrapped up its winter league on March 23.


#### Ladies Book Club




Looking to next quarter our book selections and discussions are:


