Master Association Notes

Links Community Update

1. Common Area Roadways: The Master Association voted to include Savannah and Charles Drive as common area roadways since multiple HOA communities use these roads to access the community amenities (i.e., pool and community center). The charges for maintenance and repair of these two thoroughfares will now be billed to the Master Association vice the specific HOAs. The Declaration only lists Clubhouse Drive as a common area roadway.

2. Residential Trash: The Board is looking at multiple vendors to take over the curbside trash pickup as we will no longer be able to have trash/recycle bins at the new barn when constructed. We are doing test runs with the trash trucks from multiple vendors to ensure they can maneuver the various roadways. More detail will be forthcoming after we get bids from the vendors.

3. Pool Fountain: The pool fountain has small cracks and the epoxy needs replacing. Because of the potential for leaks, a decision was made not to fill/turn on the pool fountain this pool season. Due to budget restraints, the Board voted to delay repairs until next Spring.

4. Tennis Court: The tennis court was resurfaced in the Spring, and we increased the number of pickle-ball courts from one to two due to increased interest and use from our residents.

5. PICK UP AFTER YOUR PETS and do not discard your doggie bags on the road: We continue to experience incidences of individuals not picking up after their pets and/or leaving their doggie bags on the road. As a dog owner you have the responsibility to properly dispose of dog waste. Our community is a beautiful place to take a leisurely walk and enjoy the environment, so let's not ruin it for others. If you see someone doing this, please say something or report it to any of the HOA Board members so we can address this with the dog owners. *Russ Arright*

Courtyards (CY) HOA Update

Landscaping Refresh. The Board has been actively pursuing the Common Area landscaping upgrade and rehabilitation plan discussed at the Annual Meeting.



As of print time, Battery Ridge center plaza, Battery Ridge and Clubhouse Drive entrance enhancements, and Laurel Hill Court's plaza and Freedom Court tree replacements have been accomplished. We are still working with contractors for Chamberlain and Penn Court upgrades.

Special Meeting results. A Special Meeting of the Courtyards HOA was called on April 5, 2022, to discuss and vote on a proposal from the developer to transfer a 30-foot-wide swath of land along the 9th Fairway if the HOA would offer for sale a like amount of land to the individual residents along the 9th Fairway. The Association passed the proposal (89 yes to 4 no votes) and is finalizing this action.

Lawn Care and Landscaping. The Board continues to work with the lawncare service to improve services. We expect to see earlier application of fertilizer and better lawn service this Summer.

HOA/Golf Course/Developer Disengagement Discussions. As announced in the Master Association Annual meeting, the Developer intends to closeout his development activities, consolidate golf course facilities, and sell the Links at Gettysburg Golf Course. The Courtyards (and Master) HOA is the most intertwined with Developer and Golf Course activities and we are actively working with the Developer to ensure clear and documented separation of responsibilities and ownership. We will provide more details as they evolve.

Welcome Committee. Tammie Woolgar and Lin Eichhorn volunteered to serve as the Courtyards Welcome Committee. They took over from Sharon Kuntzman who served in this role for the past several years. We want to thank Sharon for all that she has done for our community in welcoming our new neighbors to the Links.

Mount Joy Township Update

Mount Joy Township has a population of 3,724 people and is growing slowly, unlike declines in several other municipalities. Much of the growth is coming from development in the Links or other homeowners in the rural areas who are subdividing their properties to allow family members to build a home. Some real estate firms categorize the township into two roughly equal market segments: 'Green Acres' – country living older families and 'Comfortable Empty Nesters'. The 2022 assessed value of property in the township is \$515,327,900. We use the assessment to donate .25 mil rate to the fire companies, in lieu of a formal .25 mil tax used by some other townships. While the township's tax rate is low, we live in a county that is in the top 15 percent for county taxes and it is ranked 387th of the 3,143 U.S. counties in order of median property taxes. Unlike school and county taxes which are increasing, the township does not intend to increase taxes this year, although we are confronting double digit increases in the price of goods like concrete, road work materials and equipment.

We seek to alleviate our citizen's local tax burden by partnering with commonwealth state agencies. One of the areas for partnerships is with the PA Department of Community and Economic Development for obtaining financial assistance to develop and implement a multi-year financial management plan. This is different from the yearly audits that we conduct. This plan will allow us to seek further assistance on a Comprehensive Plan that will incorporate historicity and the preservation of our rural nature while allowing for smart growth. It will assess possible revenue creation and look at our financial and organizational structure. The township has also met with the Department of Environment Protection to explore cost sharing possibilities for recycling. Our initial operating focus was to gain grant monies for our chipper, but there are wider opportunities with the 902 Program where we, as a non-mandated municipality, can get grants and financial assistance for recycling.

We are also thinking of having a paper shredder event but need to gauge public interest first. If you are interested, please go to the Mount Joy web site (<u>https://mtjoytwp.us/</u>) and click on the link for paper shredder, so that we can capture your interest and accordingly plan for a date. I don't expect the initial interest to be the same as the one hundred residents who signed up to recycle their electronics in October, but we are hoping for a number that makes it worthwhile.

The township owns a one-room schoolhouse on Mud College Road. The volunteers of the Mount Joy history group are planning an open house on the 18th of September from noon to 4 p.m. Refreshments will be provided and there might even be an old-time band. Stay tuned for details. It is very gratifying to have people imbued with civic spirit who volunteer for the betterment of all.

Two Links residents were appointed by the Board of Supervisors to serve either on the Planning Commission and the Zoning Hearing Board. Chris Burne is on the Planning Commission, which is the recommending body for subdivision and land development plans, Zoning Ordinance and SALDO amendments, conditional use and zoning hearing applications. He joins the board that already has another Links resident, Ken Mutzabaugh. The Planning Commission meets the second Tuesday of the month. Gil Clark is joining the Zoning Hearing Board, which meets to determine if a variance from a Zoning Ordinance is allowed, takes appeals from determinations of the Zoning Officer and a Floodplain Administrator, and hears substantive validity challenges to a Zoning Ordinance. The Zoning Hearing Board meets as needed, and they will be needed on July 13 for two variance appeals. Both of the boards meet at 902 Hoffman Home Road at 7 p.m. and are open to the public. The Eisenhower Farm Reopens

After nearly two years of covid-related closure, the National Park Service reopened the Eisenhower National Historic Site on Memorial Day Weekend. The farm, which lies just to the west and south of the Battlefield, was the home our 34th President, Dwight David Eisenhower (Ike) and the First Lady, Mamie Dowd Eisenhower. They bought the 189-acre farm in 1950 before Ike became a candidate for office and it became his favorite getaway location during his presidency. Ike and Mamie granted the farm, the house and all the buildings to the Park Service for visitors to see after they both passed away (he in 1969 and she in 1979). The grant of the house included almost all its contents, which have been preserved by the Park Service in their original condition.

The Gettysburg Battlefield Visitors Center and the Eisenhower Farm website (<u>www.nps.gov/eise</u>) both encourage visits by taking a round trip bus ride from the Visitor's Center at \$10 a person. It is not necessary to take the bus, however; residents can drive to the entrance on Emmitsburg Avenue just south of the Confederate Avenue crossing, which is marked by an "Eisenhower" sign on Emmitsburg Avenue. As you turn into the site, signs will direct you to the limited parking available. While the site is open every day, it is only manned by rangers and volunteers Thursdays through Mondays. Tours of the Eisenhower's home start in front of the home on the hour from 10-4 during the days the site is manned.

How to Get the Same Benefits Out of Every Yoga Pose with a Chair!



Many yoga practitioners use props to assist with certain yoga poses. Blocks are often used to bring the floor a little closer and to protect the wrists. Sitting on a blanket when in a crossed leg pose can help with posture. Straps can help when doing gentle stretching.

Chairs are just another prop, like blocks and straps used in yoga to

allow us to stretch and move into poses with good body alignment. Some poses are difficult for everyone to do, and that is why there are always variations and modifications for every pose. Using a chair allows extra support making poses more accessible.

Downward Facing Dog is a classic mat yoga pose. If you've suffered injuries to your back, hips or wrists or just feel tight, Downward Facing Dog may be very difficult. Using the support of a chair Down Dog (one of the best overall yoga poses for stretching) is very similar to the mat version and the benefits are the same.

So, if you'd like to stretch, gain flexibility, strengthen muscles and increase your balance a Chair Yoga practice might be right for you. Even if you already do a mat yoga practice this can be a helpful addition to your yoga practice.

Chair Yoga is held weekly on Monday at 2 p.m. in the Community Center. Come join us!
